ICR Police Introduce Menstrual Leave for Women Officers

Itanagar: The Itanagar Capital Region police introduced a new policy whereby special leave is given to women police officers during their periods. According to the new policy, women in the police will be permitted to be absent for one working day, either on the first or the second day of their menstrual cycle every month. According to ICR superintendent of police Rohit Rajbir Singh, "this special leave would be wholly treated as 'on duty' status. So there will be no impact on the officers' attendance or leave balance."

This practice, for which a memorandum has been issued in the office, is testimony to the intent of the ICR police department to make a place of employment that appreciates the special needs of its employees to place them in a position for better health. The move is believed to be an effort toward boosting the morale, productivity, and on-field operational preparedness of women officers as they might face special challenges in their service. Tasso Kato, divisional forest officer Piyush Gaikwad, deputy director of school education Hridar Phuntsok, apart from the representatives from state and central intelligence agencies. DSP Kato made a PowerPoint presentation in which he highlighted the efforts and strategies the police in the district were taking to tackle illicit drug trafficking. He underlined the importance of bazaar secretaries and gaon burghs in gathering information and hence urged them to share actively information that would help in nabbing local drug peddlers.

Aaranyak trains Karbi women in mushroom cultivation for sustainable livelihood

Guwahati: The region's premier biodiversity conservation organization, Aaranyak, in collaboration with Chandrasingh Rongpi Memorial High School (CRMHS), recently organized a daylong winter mushroom cultivation training programme at the Community Resource Centre in Chandrasingh Rongpi village in Assam's Karbi Anglong. Over twenty participants from the Kohora and Diring River Basin Women Collectives attended the training programme. Dr. Aparna Jyoti Rabha, founder of Rabha Agrotech, Tezpur, was invited as the resource person. An expert in mushroom cultivation and spawn production, she has been instrumental in supporting local communities' livelihood development. This training initiative seeks to empower women by imparting comprehensive skills and techniques in mushroom cultivation. The objective is to provide them with a sustainable and lucrative livelihood option, thereby enhancing their financial well-being and self-sufficiency. The training program incorporated both theoretical instruction and practical application, with a particular emphasis



on the construction of mushroom-growing cylinders. Participants gained knowledge on creating optimal growing conditions, preparing suitable substrates, and identifying various oyster mushroom species. The session included practical demonstrations where participants prepared cultivation bags, mixed spawn with substrate, and created ventilation holes in growing cylinders. The training delved into the fascinating world of mushrooms, exploring their biology, life cycles, and the numerous benefits they offer. Participants also learned about the high nutritional value of mushrooms and their potential to provide a profitable livelihood for small-scale farmers. "I have practiced mushroom cultivation before, but the results were not always fruitful. Attending this train-

ing programme has been an eye-opener for me, and I hope to have a good harvest this time," Rani Singnarpi from Sivoram Terang village of Diring said. Mirmili Kramaspi, student, CRMHS, stated, "Though I am new to this method of cultivation, I am looking forward to it with high hopes and positivity. Special thanks to Aparna Ma'am for her guidance and motivation, and thanks to Aaranyak for giving us a platform and opportunity to explore this new method of cultivation." Aaranyak is committed to conserving biodiversity and ecosystems by supporting indigenous communities in the Kaziranga-Karbi Anglong and Manas Landscapes through sustainable livelihoods, education, and awareness programs. Assam government identifies 206 water bodies for flood mitigation using NESAC study

Guwahati: The Assam government, in collaboration with the North Eastern Space Applications Centre (NESAC), has identified 206 water bodies across 17 districts in Assam as part of a strategic initiative to reduce the frequency and impact of floods. Using advanced space technology, NESAC's study aims to harness these wetlands to absorb excess floodwater, potentially mitigating annual flood devastation in the region. Space Technology-Based Study for Flood Mitigation Assam, owing to its geographic and hydrological features, experiences severe floods each year, causing widespread damage to life and property. In a joint initiative between the Union and State governments, NESAC conducted a detailed study of



Assam's wetlands, identifying specific water bodies with potential for floodwater diversion and storage. The study focused on locating wetlands and oxbow lakes positioned in low to medium flood zones, using flood hazard maps prepared by the National Remote Sensing Centre (NRSC). The selected wetlands meet strict criteria: each exceeds 10 hectares in area, is located within

a 3.5 km buffer zone of a flood-prone river, and has the capacity for significant excavation and embankment work. The identified wetlands span 16,842 hectares, with a current volume capacity of 575 million cubic meters. As part of the flood mitigation project, these wetlands will be excavated to a depth of 2 meters, and surrounded by 2-meter-high embankments, effectively

increasing their volume to an estimated 1,291 million cubic meters. This increase in capacity is expected to significantly reduce flood occurrences, with projections indicating a potential flood frequency reduction of 20% to 80% in affected areas. The Assam government also plans to implement additional flood-control measures, including the construction of check dams, catchment treatment plans in upstream areas, and extensive land and water management projects aimed at sustainable flood management. The ambitious project reflects a combined Union-State commitment to addressing Assam's flood challenges through science-backed strategies, potentially bringing long-awaited relief to the region's flood-prone areas.

Dr. Tuliram Deal out Land Pattas in West Karbi

Dongkamukam: KAAC chief Dr Tuliram Ronghang said that the long-standing interstate border disputes that frequently arise between Assam and Meghalaya in the West Karbi Anglong district will be resolved. He said this while addressing as chief guest at free ceremonial patta distribution programme under No: 112 Amri LA constituency, at Boithlangso Serdihun Aklam, West Karbi Anglong. Not only with Meghalaya but tribals living in bordering State areas of Nagaland will get settled, he said. "It is a historic day for hills tribes, as we are receiving land document on the spot without spending a single pie," Dr Tuliram continued. He further said that the remaining patta will be given in a phased wise manner. Regarding PGR/VGR criticism by opposition, Dr Tuliram said that the day is not far away when everything will be crystal clear regarding our work. He also added that all major road connectivity to major towns area will be completed soon. In order to establish Autonomous State one day, he urged everyone to finally have faith in the Karbi Anglong team. MP Amarsingh Tisso in his address informed that presently its annual periodic khiraj patta and within a year conversion to medhi patta will be made. Altogether 10,000 pattas for ethnic tribals were distributed. Also "White Paper on PGR land of Kheroni" written by Karbi Anglong Autonomous Council was released by Dr Tuliram Ronghang.

Manipur civil society organizations issue seven days ultimatum

Imphal: Civil society organisations in Manipur have issued a seven-day ultimatum to the government, demanding urgent action to address the ongoing conflict in the state. The organisations have threatened to withdraw support from national political parties and launch a mass movement against political leaders if their demands are not met. Representatives from thirteen organisations submitted a memorandum to the Governor of Manipur, outlining six key demands. The memorandum highlighted the growing frustration among the people of Manipur, who feel that national parties have shown a lack of commitment to the state's security and welfare. The current crisis in Manipur is characterised by ethnic violence, unchecked militant activity, and deteriorating law and order. Residents have been suffering due to armed militant aggression, forced blockades, and escalating attacks, which threaten their livelihood and security. Following the submission of the memorandum, Shanta Nahakpam, spokesperson for the collective of thirteen organisations, addressed



the media. Nahakpam stated that they have presented a memorandum with six demands related to the ongoing crisis. The urgent requests in the memorandum include the safe rescue of six hostages abducted by Kuki militants in Jiribam District, the implementation of legal and security measures to secure national highways, the establishment of a no-entry zone in vulnerable hill areas to protect farmers, and improved coordination among all security forces to ensure a unified response in sensitive areas. The collective of thirteen organisations includes the International Peace and Social Advancement (IPSA), Peoples' Action for National Democratic Movement (PAMDM), Kangleipak Lamjing Apunba Meira Paibi Lup (Kanglamei), All Club Organisation Association & Meira Paibi Lup (ACOAM-Lup), Kangleipak Students' Association (KSA), Indigenous People's Association of Kangleipak (IPAK), Chanura Lamchingle Kangjeipak (CLK), Kanglei Ima Lup (KIL), Loumee Yaipha Lup Kangleipak (LOYALUP), Educational and Rural Development Organisation (ERDO), Malem Ima Kanba Lup (MIKL), Struggling Women's Association (SWA), and Apunba Keithel Sennaibi Lup (AKSIL). It is noteworthy that these organisations imposed a 24-hour shutdown starting from 6 pm yesterday, to protest the inadequate response from both state and central governments in protecting lives and property amid the ongoing crisis.

Guwahati: The Guwahati Jal Board has informed residents that water supply will be temporarily suspended in 28 areas of the city from November 15 to November 17. This planned disruption is likely to inconvenience thousands of residents as essential maintenance work is carried out. The affected areas include Amiya Nagar, Chamarai, Rajgarh, Lachit Nagar, Ulubari, Rupnagar, Bora Service, Zoo Road, Anil Nagar, Nabin Nagar, Tarun Nagar, Sri Nagar, Bhaskar Nagar, MT Road, Geetanagar, Ambikagiri Nagar, Sundarpur, Manik Nagar, Hengrabari, Swaraj Nagar, Zakir Hussain

Total shutdown affects normal life in Imphal Valley

Imphal: Normal life was affected in Manipur's Imphal Valley on Wednesday due to a total shutdown called by 13 civil rights organisations to protest the alleged abduction of three women and children each by militants in the Jiribam district, officials said. Business establishments and educational institutions in the five Imphal Valley districts of Imphal East, Imphal West, Thoubal, Kakching, and Bishnupur were closed due to the shutdown which commenced at 6 pm on Tuesday. No untoward incident was reported in Imphal Valley during the shutdown. Two trucks carrying goods were, however, set ablaze allegedly by armed militants near Old Kaiphundai in the Naga-dominated Tamenglong district near Jiribam. Suspected hill-based militants stopped the trucks along NH 37 by firing several rounds in the air and then torched the trucks, an official said. Rongmei Naga Students Organisation, Manipur strongly condemned the incident and alleged Kuki militants were behind it. Also Read - 38-year-old achieves Lucknow's first saffron bloom The trucks were transporting rice, onions, and potatoes for Noney and Tamenglong districts, the students' body claimed in a statement.

The Manipur Police said 10 suspected militants were killed in a fierce gunfight with security forces on Monday after insurgents in camouflage uniforms, armed with sophisticated weapons, fired indiscriminately at the Borobekra police station and an adjacent CRPF camp at Jakuradhor in Jiribam district. Meanwhile, the state unit of the Congress called for the immediate release of the three women and children each, asserting that the Centre should intervene immediately to bring an end to the clash between the two warring communities in the state. "We are not a power-thirsty party but we want to stress that for a government, the priority is to protect peace," he added. "Why are Prime Minister Narendra Modi and Union Home Minister Amit Shah still silent even when it is clear that six innocent women and children have been abducted? Are we not humans? This is not a war between different states or countries but a clash between communities within a state. The Centre and the state should have long brought a solution," he said. We have earlier stressed that the Centre should enforce a ceasefire and then call the warring groups for discussions to bring peace. Legal actions should be taken against those engaging in violence on both sides," the former chief minister of Manipur said. Creating a conducive atmosphere before talks are initiated for a permanent solution is a must and the Centre has a big role to play in it, Singh added. More than 200 people have been killed and thousands rendered homeless in ethnic violence between Imphal Valley-based Meiteis and adjoining hills-based Kuki-Zo groups since May last year. Ethnically diverse Jiribam, which was largely untouched by the clashes in Imphal Valley and the adjoining hills, witnessed violence after the mutilated body of a farmer was found in a field in June this year.


Rupali Ganguly sends defamation notice to stepdaughter

Interestingly, Sukesh, who claims to be in a relationship with Bollywood star Jacqueline Fernandez, has written that he plans to invest \$135 million (₹1130 crore) in a Los Angeles studio in dedication to his 'lady love'.



Addressing Trump as 'big bro', Sukesh congratulates the Republican President-elect on his victory over Kamala Harris in the US election. In the handwritten letter, a copy of which is with HT.com, Sukesh writes, "I remember during our last meet, decade ago, you had given me an advice, 'Accept the World the way it is or see it the way you want it to be', those words ring loud in my ears once again today, love you Bro for always motivating me and not judging me during our meets." In the letter, he also

mentions that his company, LS Holdings and LS Gaming LLC, will increase their investment in the US to \$500 million (₹4200 crore) over the next two years. But the interesting aspect of the letter includes Sukesh's reference to Jacqueline, the actor he claims he has been dating. "I remember your other advise to me, 'Treat your women always with dignity and make her always feel special', on that note, LS Holdings is buying stakes of 135 million USD, in a large studio producing shows and movies in Los Angeles. I have finalized this buy, for my lady love Jacqueline just like the advice you gave me, to 'make your women feel special'", reads Sukesh's letter.

Mumbai police arrest Raipur lawyer for threatening Shah Rukh Khan

Mumbai : The Mumbai Police on Tuesday arrested a man in Chhattisgarh's Raipur for allegedly issuing death threats to actor Shah Rukh Khan. The Bandra police station last week received a call threatening Shah Rukh Khan and asking for ₹50 lakh. A case was registered by the police under sections 308(4) (extortion involving threats of death or serious injury) and 351(3) (4) (criminal intimidation) of Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita (BNS) against the caller.

The police zeroed in on a lawyer in Chhattisgarh, named Faizan Khan. The Raipur lawyer was summoned because the threat call was made using a phone number registered in his



name. He was arrested after he didn't appear before the police.

The Mumbai police had visited Raipur and summoned Faizan Khan, who lives within the limits of the Pandri police station. Superintendent of Police

(CSP- Civil Lines) Ajay Kumar told PTI last week that Faizan Khan said he had lost his phone and lodged a complaint at the Khamardih police station. Faizan told the media that the threat call made from his phone number was part of a conspiracy

against him. "My phone was stolen on November 2 and I complained. I told Mumbai police about it. They interrogated me for about two hours," he told the media. He, however, said he had lodged a complaint against Shah Rukh Khan over a dialogue in his movie 'Anjaam' (1994) over reference to deer hunting. "I hail from Rajasthan. The Bishnoi community (which is from Rajasthan) is my friend. It is in their religion to protect deer. So, if a Muslim says something like this about deer, it is condemnable. Therefore, I objected," he said. "Whoever has made a call from my phone, it seems intentional. I think it is a conspiracy against me," he added.



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Hebden Bridge: The surprising 'lesbian capital of the UK'

None of the bars here are gay bars," said Liz Paton. "But at the same time, they all are." Paton is the charismatic owner of Drink, an independent taproom in the Yorkshire market town of Hebden Bridge, where my boyfriend and I were visiting for a long weekend. Nestled between Manchester and Leeds in the scenic Upper Calder Valley, for years this rural town – which calls itself a "bohemian paradise", thanks to its many eco-friendly shops, artisan markets, galleries and indie bookstores – had been on my wish list. And so on my recent birthday, we finally booked a trip to stroll its cobbled streets, explore its rivers and canals, climb the surrounding wooded hillsides and – of course – gaze down from its eponymous 16th-Century packhorse bridge. Though only boasting a population of roughly 4,500 people, this small, peaceful community has long been known as "the lesbian capital of the UK" – 8.95% identified as LGBTQ+ in the last Census. I was curious to trace the queer history of "Trouser Town" (a nickname referencing Hebden Bridge's manufacturing heritage). But as I soon discovered, its evolution from a rural mill town to a tolerant bastion was a bit blurry. Back in the 1970s, artists and activists were drawn here by cheap housing after the cotton mills shut down. "One historical and cultural factor [that helped establish a burgeoning lesbian community] may have been the separatist wing of 1960s and 1970s feminism," said Dr Andrew Moor, who teaches film studies at Manchester Metropolitan University. "There was an element which allied itself with alternative hippy culture's experiments in alternative living, communes and a



resistance to full-throttle capitalism. Hebden was the right size and in the right place." Former resident Bev Manders moved here in the 1980s. "Certainly up to 1986, lesbians weren't particularly visible as far as I can ascertain," she said. But so steady was the growth of the community that, in neighbouring Todmorden, a monthly Women's Disco was launched. "The first took place on New Year's Eve 1986 at Cornholme Church Hall," said Manders. "With a fair amount of women there, it's my belief that this is the point we became more visible, and it also gave others the impetus to be visible – and some to come out." The disco was held in various venues before relocating to Todmorden Cricket Club, where it still takes place on the second Saturday of the month. "Within a short time, word got out and there'd be women coming from Bradford, Leeds, Burnley and even Cumbria,

Blackpool and Nottingham." From 1986 to the early 1990s, Manders recalls that "an influx of lesbians" descended on the small town. "A number moved to the valley as they knew someone who lived there or had previously visited. Others had heard through the grapevine about this 'new' place with lesbians. In addition to the disco, there were writers' groups, book clubs, a choir and walking groups. Some were exclusively lesbian, some women-only." By the late 1990s a monthly pamphlet, Lesbian Zone, was available to buy via subscription or at specific bars – and by 2004 Hebden had the highest number of lesbians per capita in the UK. Bar owner Paton was born and raised in Calderdale but drawn to Hebden from a young age. "I was aware of the 'lesbian hippy' moniker," she said.

Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine provides strong protection against MIS-C in children aged 5–17

A recent study in *Vaccine* analyzed public health data to assess the impact of COVID-19 vaccination on childhood multisystem inflammatory syndrome (MIS-C) in California. Examining two age groups—12–17 and 5–11 years—researchers found that vaccination significantly reduced MIS-C risk in both groups. This study provides the first evidence of vaccine protection in younger children (5–11) and underscores the benefits of COVID-19 vaccination for children. While focusing specifically on the Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine, the findings support public health vaccination efforts. Multisystem inflammatory syndrome in children (MIS-C) is a rare medical condition that may develop one to two months following severe acute respiratory syndrome coronavirus 2 (SARS-CoV-2) infection. It afflicts about one in every 3,000 children. Still, it presents severe symptoms, including high fever, inflammation, and adverse outcomes across multiple systems, with all cases requiring hospitalization and between 1–2% of patients dying despite intensive care unit (ICU) support. Unfortunately, little is known about MIS-C pathophysiology and the effects of vaccination on disease risk and outcomes. Vaccination against SARS-CoV-2 is hypothesized to attenuate MIS-C risk and improve outcomes, but supporting data is derived exclusively from teenagers and older children and remains limited to small cohorts. Younger children (age group = 5–11 years) are an especially understudied population, with almost no scientific literature available on this vulnerable group. Leveraging population-wide public health datasets would allow researchers to determine optimal public health responses to increasing MIS-C prevalence and inform policymakers, parents, and public debate in today's



increasingly anti-vaccination society. The present study aims to address current knowledge gaps by evaluating the prevalence of MIS-C in vaccinated and unvaccinated Californian children between the ages of 5 and 17. Population data was acquired from the California Department of Public Health (CDPH) and included clinical records archived by the California Reportable Disease Information Exchange (CALREDIE) disease surveillance system. Additionally, vaccination surveillance systems such as the California Immunization Registry, the San Diego Immunization Registry, and the Regional Immunization Data Exchange were queried for vaccination status data (date, manufacturer, batch). Since the Pfizer-BioNTech (BNT162b2) vaccine was the first vaccine to receive necessary regulatory permissions and

achieve widespread adoption across the state of California, the present study restricted its analysis only to children who received one ('partial' vaccination) or both ('complete' vaccination) dosages of the Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine. Other vaccines (such as Moderna) were excluded from analyses. The final older (12–17 years) study cohort comprised 872,936 unvaccinated and 2,117,575 vaccinated children (n = 2,990,511), of which 66 (0.0076%) and 51 (0.0024%) developed MIS-C. Similar yet attenuated trends were observed in younger (5–11 years) children, with 51 cases in 2,113,725 unvaccinated children (0.0024%) and 9 cases in 1,221,293 vaccinated children (0.0007%). Children with MIS-C in California were more likely to be male than female, particularly in the younger age group. When restricting the

analyses to only participants with MIS-C and excluding children who only received partial vaccination, study findings revealed that 85% of younger MIS-C patients were unvaccinated. This corresponds with a 3.3-fold higher incidence rate-ratio (IRR) for unvaccinated children compared to their vaccinated counterparts. Observed contrasts were even more stark in the older age group, with 90% of MIS-C patients reporting no vaccination, corresponding with a 22.9-fold higher IRR than vaccinated children. Mortality results were similarly skewed in favor of vaccination – all 4 MIS-C-associated deaths that were obtained from public health records occurred in unvaccinated participants. Even in participants who survived, unvaccinated children frequently experienced MIS-C presentation in 6 or more organs, substantially higher than vaccinated children. Together, these results highlight that vaccination protects both against MIS-C development and severe MIS-C outcomes. The present study elucidates the protective effects of anti-SARS-CoV-2 vaccination against MIS-C risk and severity in Californian children. It supports previous data from older children (12–17 years) and presents the first evaluation of younger children (5–11 years) in vaccination-MIS-C analyses. Study findings revealed that vaccination substantially reduced MIS-C risk across both age groups. Additionally, none of the vaccinated children succumbed to MIS-C, compared to four unvaccinated children. Finally, disease severity was observed to be significantly attenuated in the vaccinated cohort. Together, these findings highlight vaccination's protective benefits against MIS-C disease risk and severity and support the ongoing government- or public health agency-promoted child vaccination campaigns.

An ideal diet look like according to new ICMR nutrition guidelines

New Delhi: In an Indian household, meal times are almost sacred, and calorie counting often takes a backseat. A typical desi household enjoys anywhere between two to three meals a day—and that's not even counting the essential chai sessions that keep us going! While our love for food is undeniable, and the sheer variety makes restraint tricky, there is also this question: Is indulging in elaborate four-course meals okay, or are we just overeating? While three meals a day today are almost indispensable (unless you're on some kind of diet), did you know breakfast wasn't always part of a typical Indian diet? Until the 14th century, it wasn't usual to consume an early morning meal in India. Meals began only around midday and the only other big meal was supper, which used to be lighter than the midday meal. "Since the population consisted primarily of land-owning farmers and gatherers, this way worked the best for them," Amarnath Halember, executive director and CEO, NextG Apex India Pvt Ltd,

told The New Indian Express. As more Indians started finding jobs in fields, homes, and factories, eating habits shifted. What was once reserved for children, the elderly, or the unwell became a routine for many workers, as they began their days with an early snack. In the 19th century, the East India Company's arrival also introduced tea, coffee, and the idea of breakfast as a formal meal, especially amongst the elite. But is that the right way forward? Dubai-based culinary



a day should be enough. That could mean two main meals with a small snack, like nuts, rather than three big meals." Bharathi Kumar, a dietitian at Fortis Hospital in Bangalore, agrees that while two meals can work for many, factors like age, activity level, and health goals also play a

role in deciding what's ideal for each individual. Recent studies indicate that eating too frequently could actually confuse hunger cues and lead to overeating, especially with carb-heavy snacks. Do Indians tend to overeat? India's typical diet is rich in carbohydrates and fats, which, as research suggests, can increase appetite and lead to overeating. With calorie-dense foods in every meal, it's worth asking: where does this leave us? Dr Madhusudan Singh Solanki, senior psychiatrist and head of psychiatry at Max Smart Superspeciality Hospital in New Delhi, explains, "The rich variety of Indian cuisines, with their vibrant and spicy dishes, along with the cultural emphasis on shared meals and food-centric rituals, can distract the brain and encourage overeating." Food as a love language In India, food isn't just sustenance; it's a love language. We celebrate, comfort, and express affection through food. "Our undefined meal patterns lead us to overeat," notes Eshanka Wahi. "

On the track, he won omnium silver at the 2016 Olympics and was a three-time madison world champion. Having delayed his retirement by a year, Cycling is such a form of freedom," he said. No marathons as Swiatek and Gauff sprint into French Open

Swiatek wound up with 48 points to just 10 for Potapova. The match ended when Potapova hit a forehand into the net on the first match point. "I was just really focused and in the zone," Swiatek said. "It went pretty quickly, pretty weird." Their match started at around 11 a.m. on Court Philippe Chatrier. That's just eight hours after men's defend-



ing champion Novak Djokovic finished his five-set, 4 1/2-hour marathon against Lorenzo Musetti just after 3 a.m. in the latest finish in tournament history. Swiatek said late finishes don't just end with the match and are not healthy. "Usually it takes us, like, four hours to even chill, and you need to do recovery, media. It's not like the work ends with the match point," she said. "I was

always one of the players that said that we should start a little bit earlier." Gauff thinks the issue needs to be addressed. "It's a complicating thing," she said. ICC awaits PCB's decision on Hybrid Model for Champions Trophy

New Delhi: The International Cricket Council has sought a response from the Pakistan Cricket Board on hosting the Champions Trophy in a hybrid model following India's refusal to travel to the country for the tournament. The PCB on Sunday had confirmed that it received an email from the ICC that India declined to travel to the neighbouring country. "Unless the PCB decides to pull out of hosting the Champions Trophy the current plan is to hold India's matches in UAE and the final in Dubai," a source told PTI on Monday. "The Indian Cricket Board has told the ICC that a Hybrid Model is acceptable to them only if the final is held in Dubai and not

in Pakistan," the source added. The PCB on Monday remained silent without giving any reaction to the BCCI informing the ICC it will not send its team to play in Pakistan in the Champions Trophy. But according to sources, the ICC has asked the PCB to confirm if a Hybrid Model -- where India's matches and the final would be held in Dubai -- is unacceptable to them. The ICC has assured the PCB that, under this arrangement, they would receive full hosting fees and a majority of the matches. "The ICC has told the PCB that if it decides to go ahead with the hosting of the mega event on a Hybrid Model it would get its

full hosting fees and majority of the matches," the source said. However, if the PCB decides to pull out of hosting the tournament due to India's refusal, the ICC could consider moving the entire event to South Africa, the source added. Earlier, a PCB source had said there was "no talk" of a Hybrid Model as of now and they would seek further clarity from the

ICC. "There is no talk about having the Champions Trophy on a Hybrid Model system as of now," a reliable PCB source told PTI. "An email is to be sent to the ICC with the advice of its legal department in which the Board wanted clarifications from the ICC on the Indian decision," the source said. "As of now

the entire situation is being gauged by the PCB. No decision has been taken on the next step. Yes the PCB is in touch with the government for consultation and directives if required," the source added. Meanwhile, Pakistani media speculated on potential responses, including the Pakistan government advising the PCB to avoid playing India altogether or the PCB pursuing legal action against the ICC and BCCI at the Court of Arbitration for Sport in Geneva. India had not travelled to Pakistan since the 2008 Mumbai terror strikes. The two teams compete against each other only in ICC tournaments.



Japan Masters 2024 Treasa-Gayatri pair exits in opening

New Delhi: In a disappointing start to their Kumamoto Masters campaign, India's Treasa Jolly and Gayatri Gopichand bowed out in the first round with a straight-games defeat against the Chinese Taipei duo Hsu Yin-Hui and Lin Yin-Hui on Tuesday. The world-ranked No. 20 Indian pair fell 16-21, 16-21 to the Taiwanese team, currently ranked 24th, concluding their match in just 36 minutes.

This loss marks the first victory for Hsu Yin-Hui and Lin Yin-Hui against the Indian pair, who still lead the head-to-head record 2-1. Treasa and Gayatri struggled to find their rhythm in a match that saw the Taiwanese pair control the tempo, capitalizing on well-placed smashes and tighter net play.

Meanwhile, Indian badminton stars PV Sindhu and Lakshya Sen will kickstart their Kumamoto Masters campaigns on Wednesday. Sindhu, a two-time Olympic medallist, is set to face eighth-seeded Thai player Busanan Ongbamrungphan in the women's singles opening round. Lakshya Sen, a World Championship medallist, will take on Malaysia's Leong Jun Hao in his opening men's singles encounter. India's Treasa Jolly and Gayatri Gopichand lost to the Chinese Taipei pair of Hsu Yin-Hui.

CT 25 snowballing into a crisis as PCB confirm BCCI refusal to play in Pak

Staff Reporter: The Pakistan Cricket Board (PCB) has confirmed receiving a letter from the Board of Control for Cricket in India (BCCI) about India's decision to not travel to Pakistan for the Champions Trophy 2025. And the tournament could now be snowballing into a major crisis. The BCCI mail was sent last week to the International Cricket Council (ICC) which formally forwarded it to the PCB. A spokesman for the PCB confirmed receiving it, stating.

"The PCB has received an email from the ICC, stating that the BCCI has informed them that their team will not travel to Pakistan for the ICC Champions Trophy 2025. The PCB has forwarded that email to the Government of Pakistan for their advice and guidance." Although it has only recently been officially confirmed, the



BCCI's stance vis-a-vis playing in Pakistan has long been known to both the ICC and the global cricket community at large - its letter is on the expected lines. The big question now is: what next? Will the ICC and PCB revert to the hybrid model, holding India's matches in the UAE? That seems an overly simplistic solution to a complex issue involving deep-rooted acrimony, tension and perennial diplomatic stand-off between two countries who

have fought wars. Given the history of India-Pakistan relations, whether this issue has been handled properly by the ICC is open to debate. The ICC could have been more proactive, felt a key official involved in the conduct of the Champions Trophy. While approving the CT budget, provisions were made for partial relocation of matches but that looks unacceptable to the PCB. Its chief Mohsin Naqvi has said in as many words. "No discussions

have been held regarding a hybrid model as of today, and we are not ready to discuss such a model," Naqvi told reporters recently in Lahore last week. Those comments may be indicative of a serious situation unfolding. For now, the PCB intends to engage with the ICC, seeking clarity on the matter. Simultaneously, it will also seek advice from the authorities within the country. A lot will understandably depend on the response of the Pakistan government. For the record, Naqvi himself is a minister in the Pakistan government. The ICC called off an event, scheduled for Monday (November 11), when it would have announced the schedule. It would have also marked the 100-day countdown to the February 19-March 19 championship. What lies ahead is not explicitly clear, but a crisis may be looming.

Spanish football manager stirs huge controversy in Italy

Staff Reporter: Fresh controversy has struck Italian football, but this time it doesn't involve the Serie A or any of its players, teams. An incident happened in Serie C where Triestina's Spanish football manager Pep Clotet had a moment of madness on Friday, grabbing and pushing his own player Raimonds Krollis, from Latvia, after he received a straight red card for a challenge. The altercation took place in the 33rd-minute when Triestina took on Giana Ermino. After the red card when Krollis was walking off the pitch, and went to his manager. But Clotet lost his cool and held the attacker by his collar and began to shake him furiously. Surprisingly, Krollis didn't defend himself, and had a dejected expression. Triestina eventually crashed to a 0-1 defeat as Gabriel Avinci scored a late winner in the 87th-minute. Speaking to reporters, he said, "I think, regarding the incident with the red card, the reaction was justified - that sending off should never happen in football." "Krollis is here on loan, representing another club that sent him here, and he does this to Triestina, to the club that entrusted him to us, and to the game itself." If a player does something like this on the street, there would be legal consequences. It's not normal, and we must not accept it in any way," he added. Meanwhile, Clotet also sacked Krollis, stating, "I told him exactly this face to face: with me as coach, he's done with Triestina from today." In the past, Clotet has managed teams like Cornellà, Espanyol B, Halmstad, Oxford United, Birmingham City, SPAL and Brescia. He has also worked as an assistant head coach at Leeds United, as part of Garry Monk's staff.

FIFA urged to avoid awarding 2034 World Cup hosting rights to Saudi

Agency: Saudi Arabia is slowly becoming a powerful force in the football world. From Newcastle United to Cristiano Ronaldo joining the Saudi Pro League, Saudi Arabia has been flourishing in the sport. They are also the lone bidder for the 2034 FIFA World Cup, but that plan has received a huge setback. According to the Amnesty International and the Sport and Rights Alliance (SRA), the World Cup should not be awarded to Saudi Arabia as it could lead to major human rights issues. In a new report, Amnesty and SRA evaluated Morocco, Spain and Portugal, who received the 2030 World Cup hosting rights, and Saudi Arabia. The report concluded that "neither bid adequately outlines how the would-be host nation would meet the human rights standards required by FIFA in its bidding regulations, nor did these bids show evidence of having meaningfully consulted with human rights organisations." Both Amnesty and SRA have stated there are high risks in awarding hosting rights to Saudi Arabia. Steve Cockburn, Amnesty International's Head of Labour Rights and Sport, said, "There will be a real and predictable human cost to awarding the 2034 World Cup to Saudi Arabia without obtaining credible guarantees of reform.



Fans will face discrimination, residents will be forcibly evicted, migrant workers will face exploitation, and many will die." "Saudi Arabia will require a vast number of migrant workers to deliver its World Cup ambitions, yet there are no commitments to reform the country's exploitative 'kafala' sponsorship system, establish a minimum wage for non-citizens, permit them to join trade unions or introduce new measures to prevent worker deaths," he added. Cockburn also urged FIFA to not award the hosting rights to Saudi Arabia if 'proper human rights protection' weren't put in place. Saudi Arabia's Bid Book for the 2034 World Cup includes plans to build or renovate 11 stadiums, provide more than 185,000 additional hotel rooms, as well as big infrastructure projects from transport connections to new cities.

India tastes defeat against South Africa

Agency: The Indian cricket team faced an embarrassing defeat against South Africa in the second T20I of the four-match series held in Gqeberha, on November 10, leveling the series 1-1. Indian batters showcased a poor skillset, posting a total of 124 runs, while South Africa won by 3 wickets. Batting first, India faltered early, slipping to 15/3 within the first four overs as the top-order crumbled. Axar Patel (27) stabilised the innings with key partnerships, adding 30 runs with Tilak Varma (20) and 25 runs with Hardik Pandya. However, South Africa maintained control, picking up wickets at regular intervals. Top-scorer Pandya (39) provided a late surge with a few big hits, helping India to a more respectable total. Marco Jansen (1/25), Gerald Coetzee (1/25), Andile Simelane (1/20), Aiden Markram (1/4), and Nqabayomzi Peter (1/20) all contributed with wickets. Bumrah to captain India in Sharma's absence: Gautam



New Delhi: The head coach of the Indian cricket team, Gautam Gambhir has announced that pace spearhead Jasprit Bumrah will lead the national men's cricket team if Rohit Sharma is unavailable for the first Test of the upcoming Border-Gavaskar Trophy series against Australia. The opening Test is scheduled to begin on November 22, in Perth. During a pre-departure press conference in Mumbai, Sharma said, "Bumrah is vice-captain; if Rohit is not available, he is going to lead in Perth." Rohit Sharma, while not currently with the squad, has not been officially ruled out of the series opener, according to Gambhir. "At the moment, there is no confirmation but we will let you know exactly what the situation will be. Hopefully he's going to be available, but everything we're going to get to know at the start of the series," Gambhir said at a press-conference before the team's departure to Australia. India's squad is departing for Australia in two separate batches, with the first group having left on November 10 and the second set to depart today. Gambhir has acknowledged the importance of contingency planning in case Rohit is unavailable, mentioning that both Abhimanyu Easwaran and KL Rahul are in the squad and ready to step up as opening options. "Obviously there is [Abhimanyu] Easwaran and there is [KL] [Rahul] there. So we will take a call closer to the first Test match if Rohit is not available," Gambhir said. "There are options there, it's not that there are no options there. There are quite a few options in the squad. To optimise their preparations, the Indian team has organized an extended camp in Perth, which will include players from the India A squad. Instead of a practice match, the management has opted for centre-wicket practice and match simulations, ensuring focused preparation ahead of the intense four-Test series.
