Maharashtra Deputy Chief Minister Ajit Pawar Among Five Killed in Tragic Plane Crash



Delhi / Baramati, Jan 28: In a shocking aviation tragedy, Deputy Chief Minister of Maharashtra Ajit Pawar lost his life on Wednesday morning when the chartered aircraft he was travelling in crash-landed near Baramati Airport in Pune district and burst into flames, aviation authorities and news agencies reported. According to the Directorate General of Civil Aviation (DGCA), the VSR Ventures-operated Learjet 45 (VT-SSK), en route from Mumbai to Baramati, went down as it attempted to land, killing all five people on board, including two crew members and two of Pawar's aides. Eyewitness footage showed the aircraft engulfed in smoke and fire with multiple explosions as it crashed in an open field near the runway. Rescue teams reached the scene, but no survivors were found. Pawar, a senior leader with deep roots in Maharashtra politics and a key ally in the state government, was travelling to Baramati—a seat he represented and his political stronghold—to participate in election-related activities. News of his sudden death has triggered widespread shock and condolences across the nation. Prime Minister Narendra Modi described Pawar's demise as "shocking and saddening" in a social media post, paying tribute to his service and leadership. The cause of the crash remains under investigation by aviation authorities, with officials expected to examine technical and operational factors.

Mukhya Mantri Eti Koli, Duti Paat Scheme Launched at Kopili Tea Estate to Honour Tea Garden Workers' Legacy

UP: Woman Booked for Railway Pension Fraud

FIR filed against Parvati Devi

Ballia, Jan 30: Police have booked a woman for allegedly posing as the wife of a deceased retired railway employee and fraudulently withdrawing pension years after both the employee and his wife had died, officials said. On a complaint filed by Dharmendra Yadav of Bhe-lai village, police registered an FIR on Thursday at Rasra police station against Parvati Devi, relatives of the late Maldhani, and some unidentified employees of the Rasra development block.

According to police, Maldhani, a former railway employee, retired from service and was drawing pension. After his death on August 28, 2007, his wife Prabhavati Devi drew the pension. Pra-

bhavati Devi died on March 21, 2014. Police said Parvati Devi was allegedly produced by Maldhani's relatives as Prabhavati Devi and continued to withdraw pension fraudulently from the Rasra branch of Central Bank.

Police booked the accused under charges of cheating, forgery and others of the Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita. Station House Officer Yogendra Bahadur Singh said police are probing the case further.



WB Govt Seeks Revision of Election Commission's Observer Appointments

WB seeks officer swaps citing 'administrative and official needs.'

Kolkata, Jan 30: The West Bengal government has written to the Election Commission, seeking changes to the list of central observers, while proposing alternative names for nine of the 15 IAS officers selected by the poll panel, a senior official said. Officers for whom replacements have been suggested include the state's home secretary, he said. The proposal was sent due to "administrative and official requirements", the official said. "The state government forwarded alternative names in place of nine IAS officers on Thursday. The Election Commission will examine the proposal and take a final call," he said.

The poll panel had recently published a list of 25 senior officials from West Bengal for deployment as central observers for the upcoming assembly elections in five states - West Bengal, Assam, Kerala, Tamil Nadu and Puducherry. The list includes 15 IAS officers, including Home Secretary Jagdish Prasad Meena, and 10 IPS officers. Police Commissioners of Howrah and Asansol also figure in the list. Earlier, the commission said it had sought the names of officers from the state government on several occasions for the appointment of central observers. "As no response was received within the stipulated timeframe,



the commission finalised and published the list on its own," an EC official said.

Alongside the list, it issued detailed guidelines, mandating compulsory briefing sessions for all empanelled IAS and IPS officers, he said.



SC: Confession Without Corroboration Not Enough for Conviction

New Delhi, Jan 30: The Supreme Court has set aside the Meghalaya High Court's order convicting a murder accused, holding that confessional statements, without corroboration, are insufficient to sustain a finding of guilt. A Division Bench of the apex court, comprising Justice Sanjay Kumar and Justice K. Vinod Chandran, allowed the criminal appeal filed by Bernard Lyngdoh Phawa and acquitted him, concurring with the trial court's earlier order of acquittal. "The confessional statements, without corroboration are insufficient to sustain a finding of guilt. There was not a single circumstance available" to incriminate the accused, the Bench observed. Ajay Sabharwal, counsel for the appellant, argued that the alleged confessions attributed to the accused could not form the basis of a conviction in the absence of independent and reliable corroboration.

He further submitted that there was no valid

evidence supporting the "last seen" theory, that the recoveries and seizures were not proved in accordance with law, and that the confessional statements were either exculpatory, inconsistent, retracted or otherwise unreliable. Agreeing with these submissions, the Supreme Court held that the alleged confessions of the appellants could not form the basis of a conviction without independent and reliable corroboration. It noted that there was no valid evidence to support the "last seen" theory, that the recoveries and seizures were not legally proved, and that the confessional statements lacked reliability.

Accordingly, the Supreme Court reversed the High Court's judgment, which had overturned the trial court's acquittal and convicted the appellant for murder and destruction of evidence. Following the High Court's conviction order, Phawa had approached the apex court by way

of a criminal appeal challenging the verdict. The appellant was represented by Sabharwal, along with Advocate on Record Prabhas Bajaj. The case dates back to 2006, when a college student in Meghalaya was reported missing and was later found buried in a graveyard.

The police arrested two of his friends, alleging that the victim was last seen in their company, that a rope was allegedly recovered and purportedly used to kill him, and that certain belongings of the victim were allegedly found in the possession of one of the accused. The post mortem report opined that the cause of death was lack of air, while the examining doctors acknowledged that the possibility of death by suicide by hanging could not be ruled out.

The prosecution further alleged that ransom calls were purportedly made and relied on confessions allegedly attributed to the accused, one of whom was in custody at the time such

calls were made. The trial court found the prosecution case to be weak and incomplete and acquitted the accused. However, the High Court reversed the acquittal and convicted them. Upon a comprehensive re-examination of the matter, the Supreme Court held that the evidence relied upon was unreliable, the investigation was allegedly marred by serious gaps, and ultimately acquitted both accused, directing their release.

Santana Chakma Appreciates ₹33.10 Cr Allocation for OBC Scholarships

Agartala, Jan 30: Tripura's Minister for OBC Welfare, Santana Chakma, has extended heartfelt thanks to Union Minister Dr. Virendra Kumar for the sanction of ₹33.10 crore under the Pre-Matric and Post-Matric Scholarship schemes for OBC students pursuing higher education in the state. The sanctioned amount includes two major tranches: ₹25 crore released on January 22, 2026 (Dy. No. 103218 JSFA); and ₹8.1 crore released earlier on April 1, 2025 (Dy. No. 70236 JSFA). These grants, issued as "Mother Sanctions," are intended to support the Central Share of the scholarship scheme and are debitable to the budget head 360106101830131 under Demand No. 093 of the Ministry. The Sub-Level Scheme (SLS) identified for Tripura is coded as TR57.

The Ministry has emphasized that no re-appropriation or change in allocation among scheme components is permitted without prior approval from the Ministry



of Home Affairs. The accounts related to these grants will remain open to inspection and audit by the Comptroller and Auditor General of India and the Ministry's internal audit mechanisms. In a statement issued on Friday, Minister Chakma said, "I sincerely thank and express my gratitude to Dr. Virendra Kumar Ji, Minister of Social Justice and Empowerment, Government of India, for allocating ₹33.10 crore for the welfare of

OBC students in Tripura. This financial support will significantly benefit those pursuing higher education under the Pre-Matric and Post-Matric scholarship schemes."

She also acknowledged the pivotal role of Tripura Chief Minister Prof. Dr. Manik Saha in securing the funds, stating, "I extend deep appreciation to our Chief Minister for his tireless efforts in this important matter." Assuring timely disbursement, Chakma added, "I want to reassure all OBC students in Tripura that the scholarship funds will be released promptly." She concluded with a message of goodwill, wishing a bright and prosperous future to all stakeholders involved in this noble and welfare-oriented initiative.

This allocation marks a significant step in promoting educational equity and supporting economically disadvantaged students from the OBC community in Tripura.

Assam Wins Top Aviation Award for Connectivity Excellence



Guwahati, Jan 30: Assam has been awarded the 'Most Proactive State under RCS-UDAN (Priority Areas)' at Wings India 2026, currently underway in Hyderabad, for its role in advancing regional air connectivity. The award was presented to the state and received by Transport Commissioner Manvendra Pratap Singh. The Chief Minister's Office stated that the recognition acknowledges measures taken by the state government to strengthen aviation infrastructure and enhance connectivity under the Regional Connectivity Scheme-UDAN.

Chief Minister Himanta Biswa Sarma said the award reflects the emphasis on expanding air connectivity to underserved and priority areas, noting that the UDAN initiative has played a key role in improving access and supporting development. Wings India 2026, Asia's largest civil aviation event, commenced on January 28 at Begumpet Airport in Hyderabad and will continue for four days, featuring discussions and exhibitions highlighting India's civil aviation sector and global industry trends.

Manipur Govt Fast-Tracks Rehabilitation for Over 3,700 Displaced Families

Manipur, Jan 30: The Government of Manipur has intensified efforts to rehabilitate internally displaced persons (IDPs) across the state, with more than 3,700 families—around 16,500 people—successfully resettled so far, officials said on Thursday.

The rehabilitation process is being closely monitored by a State Level Committee chaired by Chief Secretary Dr. Puneet Kumar Goel, along with district-level committees led by District Magistrates, to ensure secure, timely and comprehensive resettlement. Officials said the government's strategy extends beyond shifting families from relief camps, focusing equally on livelihood restoration, education and overall community well-being.



By December 2025, over 2,200 families had already been rehabilitated. To maintain momentum, around 7,000 houses have been sanctioned under the Special Pradhan Mantri Awas Yojana-Gramin (PMAY-G) for reconstruction of fully damaged homes, with construction at various stages.

The state government has released approximately Rs

1,124 crore towards the rehabilitation process and has set a target to resettle more than 10,000 families, covering over 40,000 IDPs, by March 31, 2026. "Timely and safe rehabilitation of all displaced persons remains our utmost priority," Dr. Goel said, reaffirming the government's commitment to restoring stability and normalcy in affected areas.

The Ultra-Short: Karat Slams BJP, Motha in Tripura



Agartala, Jan 30: CPI(M) Politburo member Brinda Karat on Thursday launched a sharp attack on the ruling BJP and the Tipra Motha Party, alleging that both had weakened the rights and interests of tribal communities in Tripura. Addressing a public meeting in Agartala to mark the beginning of the Ganamukti Parishad's central conference, Karat said misinformation in public discourse had increased significantly since the BJP came to power at the Centre. She alleged that BJP-ruled states were actively promoting false narratives under directions from the party's national leadership. Referring to the death of Anjel Chakma, Karat said the incident had drawn nationwide attention and should not be viewed in isolation. While those directly involved in the killing were responsible, she argued that the broader social climate that normalized racial abuse against ethnic minorities also needed scrutiny. According to her, such attitudes were being encouraged by the BJP and its ideological affiliates.

Karat further alleged that political forces in Tripura had a long history of exploiting tribal sentiments for electoral gains. She said this trend was earlier visible in the functioning of the Tripura Upa- Leader of the Opposition Jitendra Chaudhury, who also addressed the gathering, said contradictions within the ruling alliance had created confusion over the issue of tribal autonomy. He pointed out that while the IPFT continued to raise the demand for Tipraland, the Tipra Motha Party spoke of Greater Tipraland, and the BJP opposed any such demand. Chaudhury said the alliance partners needed to clearly articulate their collective position. The meeting was held as part of the events marking the commencement of the Ganamukti Parishad's central conference and was attended by party leaders and supporters from across the state.

The Ultra-Short: Road Safety Drive in Churachandpur Schools

Imphal, Jan 30: Manipur Police conducted a targeted road safety awareness programme for school students in Churachandpur district on Thursday as part of National Road Safety Month 2026, being observed under the theme "Road Safety, Life Safety". The campaign focused on key safety measures, including the compulsory use of helmets, the need for valid driving licences, the dangers of drunk driving and the importance of wearing seatbelts. Special emphasis was placed on the issue of juvenile driving. Police explained that under Section

199A of the Motor Vehicles Act, offences involving juvenile drivers attract strict penalties, including a fine of Rs 25,000, imprisonment of up to three years for parents or vehicle owners, cancellation of vehicle registration for one year and a ban on the juvenile from obtaining a driving licence until the age of 25.

The programme was conducted by Singnat Police Station under the leadership of Inspector James Vaiphei and was held across three schools—Lyzon Friendship School, St Joseph's High School and Rayburn High

School. Through presentations and interactive sessions, students were informed about various traffic violations and the corresponding penalties under the Motor Vehicles Act (2025–2026). These included driving without a helmet (Section 194D), triple riding (Section 194C), drunk driving (Section 185), driving without a licence (Section 181), dangerous driving (Section 184), overspeeding (Section 183), failure to wear seatbelts (Section 194B), use of mobile phones while driving (Section 184(c)), lack of insurance (Section 196) and disobeying



traffic authorities (Section 179).

Inspector Vaiphei highlighted the importance of instilling road safety awareness at an

early age, noting that educating students could play a crucial role in reducing traffic violations and accidents in the future.

Conserving wetlands to nurture nature, society

The World Wetlands Day marks the signing of the Ramsar Convention, a treaty for the conservation and wise use of wetlands globally. The theme for this year, Wetlands and traditional knowledge: Celebrating cultural heritage, rings close for India as it spotlights the timeless role of traditional knowledge in sustaining wetland ecosystems and preserving cultural identity. The importance of wetlands in sustaining vital ecosystems, forming a critical link between land and water with lakes, rivers, floodplains, marshes, mangroves, peatlands, and lagoons, can't be stated enough. They are agents of water security, climate regulation, food production, and livelihoods. Wetlands have sustained India's civilisational journey for millennia, from the Himalayan high-altitude lakes to the floodplains of the Ganga and the Brahmaputra, from the tanks of the Deccan plateau to coastal mangroves and lagoons. Over the past decade, the Union government has strengthened wetlands conservation through policy reforms, institutional mechanisms, and international engagement. One of the most notable achievements has been the rapid expansion of India's Ramsar network: The number of sites has risen to 96 from 26 in 2014 (an increase of about 269%)—the highest in Asia, and third-highest in the world. The network currently covers 1.36 million hectares (10% of the


known wetland extent of the country). A recognition of Udaipur and Indore as Wetland Cities stands testimony to embedding wetlands in urban development plans and programmes.

Wetlands conservation in India is supported by a strong foundation of environmental laws and regulations. The national environment policy recognises wetlands as a vital freshwater resource and calls for their prudent use. A national-level

bhagita in May 2022. This aims to enable community-driven efforts for the conservation and management of India's wetlands. The Save Wetlands Campaign was also launched as part of this Mission. India's approach to wetland conservation is inspired by the belief that transformative change begins with individuals and communities. By placing culture at the heart of wetland conservation, India is strengthening community-led stewardship, enhancing climate resilience, and ensuring wetlands nurture both nature and society.

Why gig economy turns the clock back on progress

The ubiquity of platforms and the sharing economy is evidenced by the fact that brands like Uber and Airbnb are now used as verbs in everyday vocabulary. Their products—taxis and rooms for hire—are established. The novelty is in the 'platforms' matching users and providers online using peer-to-peer systems. The sharing economy—the Orwellian term used to describe the phenomenon—is focused on transport (Uber, Lyft, DiDi), short-term accommodation (Airbnb) and food delivery (Uber Eats, DoorDash, Deliveroo). The concept is universal, allowing platform companies to operate globally to defray costs across a larger revenue stream.

The approach targets a regulated industry with decent margins, attacking incumbents and existing operating models. The suppliers are typically non-traditional. Instead of trained drivers, ordinary individuals use their own cars to ferry passengers to and from destinations. Surplus accommodation, such as empty homes or spare rooms, substitute for traditional hotels.

The platforms lower the cost, increasing access to consumers who may not traditionally use the services. This is achieved in several ways. It is theoretically 'capital-lite'. The platform acts as a broker, avoiding investment in the assets needed to provide the service. Uber drivers must provide the vehicle. Airbnb hosts own the property. Delivery drivers mostly use their own transport. It minimises the need for fixed costs such as premises.

Labour costs are reduced by the legal ruse of converting employees to independent contractors, avoiding laws specifying minimum wages, loadings for out-of-business hour work, maximum working hours or mandatory breaks, sickness leave, holidays, training costs and other benefits such as health coverage in some places. There is arbitrage of regulatory frameworks. Traditional providers must comply with requirements for licensing, insurance, training, occupational health and safety and minimum service standards. The platforms use the disingenuous argument that they are not in the transport or accommodation business to avoid these standards. The sharing economy is best thought of as farming out services to the cheapest producer, like outsourcing goods production to emerging markets to take advantage of lower cost.

The platforms undermine existing industries by cannibalising revenues. Uber's revenues are at the expense of taxis and hire cars unless they can grow the overall market. Other than in locations with poor transport options, this has not been significant despite claims by ride-share companies. The position with hotels and other accommodation providers is similar. It reduces the value of existing franchises with the price of taxi licences and share price of hotel firms having fallen wherever such platforms operate. Food delivery services may have expanded the market and reach of restaurants although setup costs, marketing fees and commissions payable to platforms, ranging from 15 to 30 percent, can significantly impact restaurants' profit margins, especially where they are small. It has also changed eating habits with consumers increasingly addicted to convenience leading to an offsetting decline in purchase of food ingredients and falls in nutrition quality. It has also influenced industry structure with some larger restaurants creating 'ghost kitchens' focused on online deliveries to lower costs.


As with many digital innovations, the sharing economy's economic benefits are overstated. Cannibalisation means that overall sector revenues may be unchanged. Even if volumes increase, lower cost reduces the overall income. Using existing unused assets is environmentally desirable but reduces investment in and purchases of new productive capacity. Where the State compensates existing providers, such as taxi and hire car licensees, for the diminution of value of licences the sharing economy is effectively subsidised by taxpayers. Any benefits may be offset by the disclosure of personal data, loss of privacy, cybercrime and security expenses to protect data and electronic payments.

The sharing economy entails a redistribution of income and wealth from providers and employees to customers. Service providers in advanced economies earn the minimum wage at best. In emerging economies, platforms may provide income opportunities where there is no other formal employment available. Earnings frequently do not take into waiting times and expenses such as fuel and unpaid labour. Fixed cost elements, such as capital investment, depreciation, insurance and maintenance, may not be properly factored into the charges. Providers face precarious existences and uncertain income always exposed to online reviews and rating systems, irrespective of validity or fairness, which can deactivate them, excluding opportunities for future work.

Top Brinjal Dishes from Various Regions of India

Regardless of whether it is roasted, stuffed, fried, or pickled, brinjal remains an integral part of India's culinary tradition. Ennegai: In North Karnataka, brinjal is transformed into ennegai, a stuffed delicacy. Baby brinjals are filled with a masala paste made from



District Coordination Committee Reviews SPARSH Leprosy Awareness Campaign in Haflong



Haflong, Jan 30: A meeting of the District Coordination Committee was held today at the office of the Joint Director of Health Services, Haflong, to review and plan activities for the SPARSH Leprosy Awareness Campaign (SLAC), which will be observed from January 30 to February 13, 2026. The 15-day-long campaign aims to create mass awareness that leprosy is a fully curable disease and that free treatment is available at all government health institutions. The initiative focuses

on reducing social stigma, promoting early detection, and ensuring that no affected individual is left untreated. Addressing the meeting, Dr. Leena Hakmaosa, In-charge Joint Director of Health Services, emphasized the need to intensify awareness efforts, dispel myths associated with leprosy, and strengthen community participation. She informed that the main thrust of the campaign would be through Gram Sabha meetings organized in collaboration with the Panchayat and Rural Development Depart-

ment (PNRD). Dr. Hakmaosa also highlighted that the campaign aligns with the national goal of eliminating leprosy by the year 2027. The meeting underscored the importance of early detection, timely treatment, and active community involvement in achieving a leprosy-free society. On the occasion, a pledge was administered to all participants, reaffirming their commitment to spreading awareness and supporting leprosy eradication efforts. The observance of Anti-Leprosy Day further reiterated

the Health Department's resolve to combat the disease through sustained education, awareness, and prompt medical intervention. Speaking on the significance of early diagnosis, Dr. Veiphei stressed that screening a maximum number of individuals with any form of skin-related symptoms is crucial for early detection and successful treatment of leprosy. Medical and health workers were urged to intensify screening activities across the district. Providing the current status, Dr. Marina Changsan informed that at present, three leprosy cases have been detected in Dima Hasao district and are undergoing treatment. She noted that early identification plays a vital role in ensuring effective treatment and preventing further transmission of the disease.

COCOMI Holds Massive 'Save Manipur Rally' Demanding Resettlement Of IDPs

Manipur, Jan 30: The Coordinating Committee on Manipur Integrity (COCOMI) on Saturday organised a massive public rally in Imphal, demanding protection of Manipur's territorial and social integrity and the restoration of a popularly elected government in the state. Expressing concern that hundreds of displaced families are yet to be rehabilitated, leaders of the civil society group said the rally was organised to reflect public sentiment calling for the immediate resettlement of all internally displaced persons (IDPs) and the restoration of free movement along all national highways. Protesters raised slogans demanding protection of democratic rights, immediate rehabilitation of displaced families and an end to President's Rule in Manipur. With President's Rule set to complete one year on February 12, several speakers at the rally voiced concern over its continuation

in the state. In July 2025, Parliament had extended President's Rule in Manipur by six months until February 13, 2026, with Union Home Minister Amit Shah citing the need to fully restore law and order before resuming the political process.

COCOMI leaders said the rally was aimed at sending a clear message to the Government of India that the people of Manipur seek peace, justice, development and the return of a democratically elected government. They expressed confidence that the rally, titled Manipur Kanba Khongchat (Save Manipur Rally), would strongly convey the aspirations and concerns of the people to New Delhi. The rally began from Tiddim Ground, Kweiteithel, and witnessed participation from clubs, organisations, women's groups and civil society members from across the state. It concluded at Thau Ground with a public convention.

De Kock hundred in his 100th T20 leads South Africa to series win over West Indies

The “Easy Win”: SA Cruises Past WI’s 221 With 15 Balls to Spare

Centurion, Jan 30: Quinton de Kock celebrated his 100th Twenty20 international with a century as he powered South Africa to a seven-wicket victory over the West Indies on Thursday. De Kock hit a career-best 115 off 49 balls with a borrowed bat from Dewald Brevis. Ryan Rickleton finished the rout with a career-best 77 not out off 36. The left-handers battered the West Indies for 162 runs in 11.5 overs. Together, they had South Africa flying at 12 runs per over. “Special to watch,” South Africa captain Aiden Markram said. “Quinton put on a great show for the crowd. Ricks flies under the radar but to get us home back to back is a good effort from him.”

The West Indies made a hefty 221-4 but South Africa cruised to 225-3 with 15 balls to spare. The target didn’t faze the Proteas. They chased down 258 against the West Indies on the same ground in 2023, led by de Kock’s 100, his only previous T20 century. After losing five straight bilateral T20 series, South Af-

rica gave coach Shukri Conrad his first T20 series win as they clinched it 2-0 with a match to spare. That third match is on Saturday, then both teams head to the T20 World Cup starting next week in India and Sri Lanka. De Kock was rested from the first T20, where Markram hit

he miscued to mid-off and was out after smashing 10 sixes and six boundaries. Rickleton was dropped on 17 and happy to play second fiddle to de Kock. He had just got to his fifty off 25 balls when de Kock left then finished the match in a rush. Rickleton hit nine boundaries and three sixes. The West Indies made only one change after the first T20, bringing in captain, wicketkeeper and opening batter Shai Hope. But he was out for 4 from a nick behind. That brought in Shimron Hetmyer, who overtook opener Brandon King en route to a 30-ball fifty, two days after hitting 48 in Paarl. Their partnership of 126 ended when King was caught on the boundary on a 30-ball 49. Hetmyer was fourth out after a 42-ball 75, 50 of them from boundaries. Sherfane Rutherford then blasted 57 in an unbroken stand of 76 with Romario Shepherd, who made 17. Spinner Keshav Maharaj was the pick of the South Africa bowlers with 2-22. Markram said without that spell they would have been chasing 240-250.



86 not out in a nine-wicket win chasing 174. The captain made only 15 this time but de Kock, who was on 6, took up the mantle and launched sixes against five of the six West Indies bowlers.

He brought 50 up in 21 balls and got to 100 off 43. He was going for a third consecutive six off Akeal Hosein when

Olivia Gadecki, John Peers retain Australian Open mixed doubles title

Gadecki, Peers Make AO History

Melbourne, Jan 30: Olivia Gadecki and John Peers became the first team to win consecutive Australian Open mixed doubles titles since 1989 after beating the French pair of Kristina Mladenovic and Manuel Guinard 4-6, 6-3, 10-8 on Friday. The Australians trailed 7-5 in the final-set tie-breaker before coming back to lead 9-7. On match point and with Peers serving, Guinard hit a backhand into the net to clinch victory for the home players at Rod Laver Arena. Wild-card entries Gadecki and Peers were the first reigning Australian Open mixed doubles champions to return to the final the following year since Mladenovic and Daniel Nestor in 2015. The 23-year-old Gadecki was born 13 years after Jim Pugh and Jana Novotna went back to back in 1988 and 1989. “Sort of a bit shocked,” Peers said. “That could have

gone either way. Just sort of happy that we kept sticking with it . . . it was on a knife’s edge.” The French team won the opening set on its second set point when Peers hit a shot wide, three games after

the match.

Mladenovic was trying to win her fourth Grand Slam mixed doubles title — she won Wimbledon in 2013 and the Australian Open in 2014 with Nestor and the 2022



Mladenovic double-faulted on set point and the Australian team broke to keep the set alive.

In the second set, Gadecki and Peers went ahead 3-1 on a service break and then held to take a 4-1 lead, winning 13 of 15 points to put them in control of the set and level

Australian Open mixed doubles title with Ivan Dodig. She also has six Grand Slam women’s doubles titles. “Winning a Grand Slam once is very difficult but defending it is even harder . . . big congrats to you!” Mladenovic said to Gadecki and Peers.

The Punchy: Villa Edge Salzburg in 3-2 Thriller



England, Jan 30: Jamaldeen Jimoh-Aloba’s first-ever goal for Aston Villa was an 87th-minute winner in a 3-2 comeback victory over Salzburg to conclude the opening phase of the Europa League on Thursday. The 19-year-old Jimoh-Aloba’s strike followed Tyrone Mings’ equalizer at Villa Park. Morgan Rogers sparked the comeback in the 64th after the visitors built a 2-0 lead on own goal from Victor Lindelof and then Moussa Yeo’s goal. Villa wasn’t able to overtake Lyon atop the 36-team standings, however, after the French team beat 10-man PAOK 4-2 to remain in front of Unai Emery’s team on goal difference. Both Lyon and Villa had already secured a spot in the round of 16. Like in the Champions League, the top eight finishers advance automatically to the last 16. The teams placed from nine to 24 enter a two-leg playoff. The rest of the top eight are: third-place Midtjylland, Real Betis, Porto, Braga, Freiburg, and Roma. Midtjylland, a Danish club, beat Dinamo Zagreb 2-0 to move up to third, two points back of Lyon and Villa. In Seville, former Manchester United winger Antony scored and set up Abde Ezzalzouli’s goal in Real Betis’ 2-1 win over Feyenoord. Porto rallied from a goal down to beat Rangers 3-1 and jump from ninth to fifth, Braga advanced in the sixth spot after a 0-0 draw at Go Ahead Eagles, and 10-man Freiburg slipped to ninth with a 1-0 loss at Lille. Jan Ziolkowski headed in an 80th-minute equalizer for Roma in a 1-1 draw with Panathinaikos.

Sophie Molineux named Australia women’s T20 captain for India series

Sydney, Jan 29: Spin bowling all-rounder Sophie Molineux was on Thursday appointed the Australian women’s T20 captain for the series against ODI world champions India next month and will succeed Alyssa Healy as the leader across formats after the home assignment. Healy had announced that she would retire from international cricket after playing against India in which she will captain the Australian team in three ODIs and a one-off Test. Australia’s squads for all formats were announced on Thursday. India’s tour of Australia begins on February 15 with a three-match T20I series starting at Sydney. The other two matches will be played on February 19 and 21 at Canberra and Adelaide.

The three-match ODI series will be played on February 24, 27 and March 1. The first match will be held at Brisbane’s Allan Border Field while the next two will be at the Bellerive Oval in Hobart. The one-off Test between India and Australia



will be played at the iconic WACA Ground in Perth from March 6 to 9. Following this, Molineux will be Australia’s captain in all formats starting with a tour of the West Indies in March. While Tahlia McGrath was retained as the vice-captain, another spin bowling all-rounder Ashleigh Gardner has been appointed as co-vice-captain. Nicola Carey, who is currently playing for Mumbai Indians in the Women’s Premier League, has returned to the white-ball formats while 19-year-old Lucy Hamilton, in the Delhi Capitals’ camp, has been named in the Test side.

The selectors have also

named Phoebe Litchfield in their squads across formats despite the left-handed batter being ruled out of the ongoing WPL. While Alana King has been excluded from the T20I squad, Megan Schutt, Grace Harris and Heather Graham do not feature in the ODI side. Schutt was expected to retire from ODIs after Australia’s loss to India in the World Cup semi-final last year.

The 28-year-old Molineux has also been the youngest captain in the Women’s Big Bash League when she took over the reigns from Meg Lanning at Melbourne Renegades, and went on to lead Victoria later.
